

## Celebrating 800 Years of Grace



YEARS AGO, St Dominic received official recognition from Pope Honorius III for a new religious order whose purpose was preaching for the salvation of souls.

St Dominic's experience as an itinerant preacher in the south of France showed him the need for an educated clergy whose lives of voluntary poverty, chastity and obedience could underwrite their message.

The emerging universities in Europe also posed challenging questions that required a deeper understanding of the union between faith and reason. They nurtured gifted individuals who would offer their lives for this new mission.

This Jubilee celebrates all that the Order has achieved

through God's grace. It inspires us to reflect on our calling and plan for our future mission. Providentially, the Dominican Jubilee overlaps with the Year of Mercy called by Pope Francis, providing an additional theme for reflection and renewal.

We rely as always on the prayers of St Dominic and the great company of 102 other canonised Dominican saints and 374 blesseds.

## Special Report from Syria

R TIMOTHY RADCLIFFE joined an international delegation in November 2015 on a visit to Syria. His report reveals the humanity behind the headlines:

"I was invited by Mairead MaGuire, who jointly (with Betty Williams) won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1976 for her work in Northern Ireland, to join a small Peace delegation to Syria. We were Christians, a Hindu, and a few agnostics. I leapt at the opportunity to go. For me this was, above all, a chance to show some solidarity

with Christian communities, among the oldest in the world, who felt deserted and forgotten.

"Our base was a
Carmelite monastery in
the mountains, halfway
between Damascus and
Homs. It was about
three miles from the
frontline with ISIS. Sleep
at night was difficult
because of the artillery
fire. We met
government officials,
imams, bishops, opposition

leaders, religious

people in the street.

"I was deeply struck by the profound friendship between Christians and so many Muslims. In the village just below the monastery, Muslims came to the Catholic Church to celebrate the birth of the

putting up Christmas trees as a sign of their closeness to Christians. In Tartus we visited the first mosque ever to be dedicated to Our Lady, and the imam there sung the sutra from the Qur'an that is in her honour. We had a day with the Melkite Patriarch who was overjoyed at our visit, and who is a close friend of the Grand Mufti of Syria, with whom we had a couple of hours.

"It is hard to discern the true situation of Syria. The West has its own narrative, in which the President,

Bashar al-Assad, is seen as a cruel tyrant who must be removed from power as soon as possible. Nearly all the people with whom we talked had other narratives. People feared an imposed regime change even more than Daesh. They had seen how in Iraq and Libya this had led to chaos and the flourishing of terrorism. As

Dominicans, we know that the truth is to be arrived at patiently and humbly, listening attentively all voices. I was saddened, returning to the UK, by the simplistic certainty with which so many politicians write of this complex country.

"The atmosphere is saturated with violence. In Damascus people carried

around AK47s as if they were umbrellas. Homs was virtually destroyed. We visited Maaloula, a Christian village in which Aramaic is still spoken. Before we could have breakfast we were hustled into cars and driven away at speed. We had been spotted by al-Nusra Front, an affiliate of al-Qaeda; an attack was imminent.

"Everywhere, Christians and Muslims are labouring to produce reconciliation, at the risk of their lives. I slowly became aware of how much this violence magnifies upon a terrible screen the violence that is so pervasive of Western gun culture. I went to see *Spectre*, the latest James Bond movie, shortly after my return. This is the sort of film that the jihadists love. But Bond's final act was to throw away his gun. We shall only defeat Daesh if we heal our souls of violence."


### Herbert McCabe on Politics and Religion

HE DOMINICAN ORDER has Veritas (Truth) as one of its mottos, and to mark the Jubilee the Las Casas Institute at Blackfriars, Oxford, has inaugurated a series of lectures and one-day conferences on the theme of Truth in contemporary society. Professor Denys Turner of Yale University began this series by delivering the annual Las Casas Lecture in October 2015, on the theme of Truth-telling and politics, as understood by a familiar figure for the English

brethren – their late brother **Fr Herbert McCabe**. **Fr Peter Hunter** summarises:

"The key idea explored by Prof Turner in the lecture is the relationship of Christianity to politics. He first set out the false view that they are related in the way oil and water are: water and oil displace each other and they are alternatives to one another. Similarly, modern secularism tries to push religion out of the political sphere, or the religious right seeks to sacralise the political.

"Turner presents McCabe as saying that both are, roughly



speaking, making the same mistake, and not because they present religion and politics as different, but because they do not see them as different enough. The day-to-day business of politics, Turner compares to the true Christian politics using the image of blind people bumping into objects in a dark room, as compared with seeing the room with the light on, and recognising it as a sitting room, thus grasping its meaning.

"The principal relationship of the Church to politics is prophetic, Turner asserts. He pointed to the true meaning of human existence as a life of love: a love destined to be rejected by the sinful world and killed. In Herbert's words: 'If you do not love, you will not be alive, but if you do love, you will be killed.'"

### 'There is no fear in love': Durham

On 7<sup>th</sup> November DYM marked the beginnings of the Order's celebration of its 800<sup>th</sup> Jubilee with a retreat day at the Dominican-run Catholic

chaplaincy at the University of Durham. The retreat gathered students from our chaplaincies in Durham and Edinburgh to reflect on the role of emotion and desire in our Christian journey of discipleship. The day concluded with a prayer vigil and dinner, courtesy of a local pub.

#### 'Illumination': Leicester

November also saw the launch of 'Illumination', a twenty four-hour immersion in the Dominican Tradition aimed at students and young adults, and hosted by the Dominican-run Catholic chaplaincy at the University of Leicester. The title 'Illumination' is inspired by the 'O Lumen', the great antiphon that the Dominican Order sings in honour of our Holy Father St Dominic every evening at Compline. This antiphon addresses

St Dominic as 'a light of the Church', and in this

inaugural meeting a team of Dominican friars and sisters offered participants the opportunity to experience for themselves the prayer, study, common life, and mission that St. Dominic bequeathed to his Order, and the way that these pillars of our tradition can lead us into a deeper encounter with Christ. #### 'Journey into the Light': Boars Hill, Oxford

This year's DYM Advent study weekend was hosted by the Carmelite community at Boars Hill. Participants were offered the opportunity to explore the infancy narratives in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke as part of a broader reflection on the significance of the coming of God as Man that we celebrate at Christmas. ### Conference: Truth Telling & the Media

A RECENT CONFERENCE in Oxford, organised by the Las Casas Institute at Blackfriars Hall, sought to examine the challenges of truth-telling in a world of rapidly breaking news stories and mass participation via social media.

Fr Simon Gaine started the conference by asking: Do the modern media conceal or reveal truth? Do they tell our story in a helpful or unhelpful way? What can the media teach the Church?

Addressing the conference from Syria, **Fr Timothy Radcliffe** explained how the conference furthered the mission of the Las

Casas Institute to be a place of encounter and collaboration between those who experience and observe injustice and others who reflect on solutions to that injustice.

**Professor Nicholas Boyle** looked at how the mass media is abused by the internet troll and the terrorist. By hiding behind the keyboard, the internet troll fears only words being returned in retaliation whereas the terrorist exploits the illusion of global knowledge by offering real violence whose threat resounds through



the structures of the mass media. Both trolls and terrorists, Boyle explained, exist free of the economy, state, and society as triply detached individuals, as Hobbesian pre-social humans.

**Tim Livesey** (standing in for Edward Hadas) argued that news content is often rushed to provide speedy delivery to viewers or readers, resulting in the truth being sacrificed to meet deadlines, making it unattainable. The Gospel, conversely, calls us to a higher standard of truth than we would naturally choose for ourselves. The truth is painful, it is never thin or glib, and cannot be rushed.




